

The Androscoggin River Trail is a 1.78 Mile culmination of 16 years of planning and development which has resulted in one of the finest trail systems in the State of Maine. The Lisbon Trail System consists of the .77 mile Paper Mill Trail, the .8 mile Ricker Farm Trail, and finally the Androscoggin River Trail for a total of 3.35 miles. This system provides a unique opportunity to connect those aspects which make Lisbon more than a Town but a great community to live, work, and play. The Lisbon Trail System is also part of the East Coast Greenway, a 2,900 mile trail network linking cities from Maine to Florida, and provides access to our economic centers, our schools, and our remarkable natural resources.

- Androscoggin River Trail Construction Begins – 2013
- Androscoggin River Trail Construction Completion – August 2014
